Deceased, who followed the occupation of a miner up till a couple of years ago, contracted the dreaded miner's complaint, and gradually became worse and worse towards the end until death was a happy release from his sufferings.

He was well known in the Costerfield district, coming from there to Rushworth over twenty years ago.

Deceased was comparatively a young man, being but 41 years of age, and leaves a wife and four young children to mourn his death.

The remains were interred in the local cemetery on Tuesday afternoon, and the respect in which he was held was shown by the large number of people who joined the funeral cortege.

The Rev. F. J. Jennings performed the funeral obsequies.

Deceased was a member of the Foresters' Lodge, and there was a good attendance of members, some of whom acted as pall-bearers. The lodge's impressive burial service was read by Bro. Chris. Brown.
