We regret to have to record the death of Mr James Poulson, who expired at his residence, Moora-road, Rushworth, on Saturday last from miners' asthma.

The deceased, who was a native of Denmark, arrived in the colony in 1857, and resided for some years at Costerfield, from which place he removed to Rushworth about 15 years' since.

Mr Poulson took considerable interest in mining, and for a number of years was a member of the committee of the A.M.A. and also its president.

His many good qualities made him a great favourite with all with whom he came in contact.

The remains were on Monday followed to their last resting place, the Rushworth cemetery, by a large number of people.

The service was read by the Rev. J. R. Walker. The funeral arrangements were carried out by Mr Anderson.
