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As briefly reported in our last issue, the death occurred on 3rd November, at his home, Tatura Road, Rushworth, of Joseph Henry Lloyd.

His death followed an illness of over three years, which he bore with great fortitude.

There was a representative gathering at the graveside when the remains were interred in the Rushworth Cemetery on Thursday afternoon of last week.

Four sons – Messrs V. C. Lloyd, R. A. Lloyd, C. A. Lloyd and W. J. Lloyd – bore the casket to the graveside.
