Mr and Mrs H. Lambden's many friends will regret to learn that their second daughter, Caroline, succumbed to an attack of brain fever on Tuesday last after an illness of nearly a month's duration, during which she suffered severely.

The deceased was a bright, intelligent girl, who had only attained her 18th year, and great sympathy is expressed with the bereaved family in their loss.

Dr Christie was most attentive to her during her illness, and although he did all that medical skill could suggest he was unable to save her.

The remains were followed to their last resting place, the Rushworth cemetery yesterday by a large concourse of people. The Rushworth brass band led the way, playing the Dead March in Sault and walking beside the coffin were six of her girl-friends dressed in white and

carrying large floral tributes.

Following the relatives of the deceased were about 50 children, with handsome bouquets of flowers, and a number of ladies outside the procession also carried wreaths in their hands. There were also some very handsome floral tributes placed on the coffin before the cortege started.

The Rev. J. R. Walker, who officiated at the grave, in addition to the usual service, by special request of some of her United Methodist friends, gave out the 523rd hymn, a good many of those present joining in the singing.
