Again and again are we compelled to announce the untimely death of some factor of our population. Every week it is the same story of the fell attack of the insidious Typhoid Fever.

This week, unfortunately, is not an exception to its predecessors, for we have now to chronicle the death of Miss Nellie Anderson, second daughter of Mr G. Anderson, of High Street, Rushworth.

The deceased, who had just attained the age of 16 years, was attending the Rushworth State School, and was a general favourite with every scholar.

In her case the disease proved of a very rapid character, probably owing to congestion of the lungs supervening.

The decease took place on Tuesday morning at 7 o clock, and the interment on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The remains were followed to the grave by a very large concourse of people, including the Forester's Lodge, State School children, and friends throughout the district.
