The deceased, who was inflicted with blindness, and had been in ill-health for some time past, wandered into the kitchen, when the other members of the family were outside, and fell into the fire.

Her clothing caught fire and she was severely burned about the body before assistance arrived.

The late Mrs. Blake, who is 83 years of age, was one of the oldest residents of Rushworth, having lived on the Stanhope road for over 30 years.

She was much esteemed by all who knew her, and the sad circumstances of her death is greatly regretted. She leaves her husband and a grown-up family of five sons and five daughters to mourn their loss.

The funeral took place on Saturday, the remains being interred in the Rushworth cemetery. The burial service was read by the Rev. F. C. Boundy.
