A very sad death occurred in Rushworth on Sunday morning last, when the wife of Mr E. F. Geyle passed away quite unexpectedly. Some few hours previously deceased gave birth to a child, to all appearances, was doing splendidly. Later, a change took place and it was deemed advisable to call in the services of Dr Heily. Medical skill was of no avail, however, and death ensued in about an hour after the doctor's arrival.

Mrs Geyle was a fine, strong, healthy woman and quite a shock was experienced by the townspeople on learning of her untimely demise. She was of a cheerful, though unassuming disposition, and was on the best of terms with all with whom she came in contact.

General sympathy is expressed for Mr Geyle, who has sustained a heavy blow, and is left to mourn his great loss with four small children. Deceased was only a young woman, being in her 29th year.

The remains were interred in the local cemetery on Monday afternoon, the funeral cortege, which was a lengthy one, being headed by the Rushworth Brass Band (of which body deceased's husband had always been a prominent member) playing the Dead March in Saul. The Rev. J. R. Walker read the burial service, Mr Anderson being the undertaker.
