With her husband, deceased came to Victoria over fifty years ago and soon found their way to Rushworth, where her husband selected land a few miles north of the town and they carried on farming pursuits until the time of her husband's death, which took place some years ago.

She also was of a jovial, kindly nature, and was held in the highest esteem.

She was the mother of a large family, who are all grown up.

The funeral, which took place yesterday, was largely attended.

The Rev. J. Weir, B.A., conducted the burial service at the grave.
