As briefly reported in our last issue, the death occurred on Tuesday last week, at the residence of her daughter (Mrs Kruger), Northcote, of Mrs. A. M. Potter, relict of the late Mr. James W. Potter of Nuggety Gully, Rushworth.

The deceased was the eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Owen, of Rushworth, and was born in Adelaide. She resided in Nuggety Gully for the best part of her life, having come here with her parents when she was very young. Recently she resided with one of her daughters (Mrs. Colliver) at Whroo.

A short time before her death she went to her daughter (Mrs. Kruger) for a holiday where she took ill and died as stated.

The late Mrs. Potter was of a kindly disposition and always ready to help her neighbours, and was highly respected. She went to the Rushworth State school when a girl and took part in the "Back to School" on the occasion of the "Back to Rushworth" celebrations last Easter.

She leaves a family of ten children --- George, James, Richard, Thomas and Jack (sons) and Nettie (Mrs. Colliver), Sophie (Mrs. Wade), Annie (Mrs. Kruger), Mabel (Mrs. Matthews) and Eva (Mrs. Campbell) daughters, also three sisters --- Mesdames Matthews, Shewan and Cleary.

The remains were brought from Melbourne and interred in the Rushworth Cemetery. Prior to the burial the casket was conveyed to St Paul's Church of England, where a service was held, which was conducted by the Rev. Cole, of Northcote, assisted by Rev. Canon Grist.

At the close of the service the Dead March was played by Miss Walbran. The burial service was conducted by the Rev. Cole and Cannon Grist.

The funeral arrangements were carried out by Mr. Ferguson of Northcote.
