CORONER'S INQUEST.

An inquest was held by J.V. Heily, Esq., deputy coroner, at the Criterion Hotel, yesterday, on the body of Reuben Furfey, aged sixteen years, who was killed by accidentally falling off a wagon, at the Home Station Plain, on the 5th inst.

Joseph Furfey sworn, said: I am brother of deceased. At the time of the accident, deceased was sitting on a wagon, loaded with hay; he was driving. The horses were walking quickly; when they came to the fence, the horses turned round. At that time my brother seemed to have lost control over them, and they commenced to trot; he did not stop them; they came in contract with the fence, and the hay was shifted.

The deceased was thrown or fell off. The horses went about seven yards after that and then stopped. I did not see deceased strike the fence, or the wagon pass over his body. He was insensible when I picked him up; there was blood on his face and a cut on the crown of his head, and a lump on his forehead. I took him home; he soon recovered his senses. The feeling was perfect in his feet, he got better till about three o'clock; at that time his pulse commenced to fail. I then went over for our mother, about four miles.

When we came back, he was wandering in his speech, and worse. My mother wished him removed home; we put him in a spring cart. When we had gone about a quarter of a mile, I looked at deceased, and he was sleeping; hut when we got home he was dead. We gave notice to the police. I did not think him in danger, or I would have sent for a doctor. I was about thirty yards distant from the wagon when the accident happened.

A verdict of "Accidental death" was returned.
