DEATH OF MR. DEARMAN. - About one o'clock on Friday morning, Mr. Thomas Dearman died at Rushworth, after a short illness extending over a day or two only.

He was suffering from inflammation of the lungs, and so severe was the attack that Dr. Heily, who attended him, saw there was no chance of saving his life some time before life expired.

Mr. Dearman leaves a wife and two children to lament his loss.

Mr. Dearman was the Revenue Inspector for Waranga Shire Council.
